## Regular or Danish Judging System

### FAMILY LIVING & CHILD DEVELOPMENT EXHIBITS

1. Exhibitor is required to carry project which he or she is exhibiting in respective youth organization.
2. All posters must be no smaller than 11"x14" or larger than 14"x22".

### **Class A – Beginning Family Living & Child Development I & II – Grades 3 – 6**

Lot Numbers, Class A:

1. Item made for a child with whom you work with. Include a description of how this item affects the child's development.
2. A puppet made by member with a script teaching a concept such as safety, color, shapes, nutrition, eating habits, emotions, numbers, etc. to a child.
3. Develop a story for a pre-school child illustrated with pictures in book form. Tell why this book is suitable for a child.
4. One toy made by member – tell why it is appropriate for the child you work with. Include age of child.
5. Poster explaining some aspect of the development of the child (nutrition, safety, health, talking, play, growth, etc.)
6. A chart, poster, or exhibit displaying the member's future plans or goals in the project or in the area of child development.
7. Any other article not previously listed but related to the project. Attach a complete explanation including what age article is appropriate for and why and/or how it could be used.

### **Class B – Advanced Family Living & Child Development III – Grades 7 and Older**

Lot Numbers, Class B:

1. Poster focusing on a "Father's Role in Parenting"
2. Storybook made for a child
3. Toy made by exhibitor which is other than wood, indicate who will use the toy and how it will benefit the child
4. Wooden toy, indicate who will use the toy and how it will benefit the child
5. Game for a child, indicate who will use the game and how it will benefit the child
6. Poster with pictures showing the 4 areas of growth of a child, mental – physical – social – emotional
7. Safety poster or exhibit
8. Educational poster related to how to be a good babysitter
9. Educational poster related to how a child learns through play (for example: good books to read to a specific age group, songs and games for pre-schoolers, etc.)
10. Educational poster on a party for (give age) children
11. Art work made by project child with exhibitor's help
12. Babysitting Kit, indicate why each item is included in kit
13. Any self-determined project not listed above.
