Youth Fair Rules & Regulations

TAYLOR COUNTY YOUTH DIVISION FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Taylor County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising, out of the fair.
2. The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgment, deem advisable.
3. An exhibitor who violates any of the following or special rules may be disqualified.
4. Taylor County Fair follows and abides by the Wisconsin Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Rules & Regulations as published in ATCP 160.01, Subchapter 1 – V. These rules can be viewed here: https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/code/admin_code/atcp/140/160/Title

JUNIOR EXHIBITOR FAIR RULES:

1. Entries are open to all boys and girls in Taylor County and Counties immediately adjacent to Taylor County, who are enrolled in member organizations, but only in those divisions in which they are carrying project work as defined by the regulations of their organization. Member's grade is determined as of January 1 of the current year. Members must be in third grade or age eight as of January 1 of the current year with the exception of Youth Organizations' Early Childhood Categories in Dept 17 (Exploring) who can show in grades K-3.
2. Eligibility of each entry must be vouched for by authorized representatives of member organizations and approved by the board of directors.
3. Entries must be submitted online no later than June 24 of current year. Entry corrections (not additions) must be complete by July 1.

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4. Barn decorations can be put in place starting at 2 p.m. the Sunday prior to the fair, and must be up by 11:30 a.m. on exhibit entry day.
5. Each EXHIBITOR is responsible for submitting entry payment by June 24 of the current year.
6. ALL exhibits must be in appropriate place at the Taylor County Fairgrounds by 11:30 AM on Thursday of the fair and may not be removed from the fairgrounds before 5:30 pm Sunday of the fair, unless removed by vet, judge, or safety panel, or otherwise given express written permission signed by exhibits committee. MASS animals will be released with discretion of the fair board.
7. Exhibitors are responsible for their own exhibits and, at the close of the fair, take charge of the same. The Taylor County Fair will take every precaution for their safekeeping, but will not be held responsible for any damage or accident that may occur. Exhibitors will be held responsible for any damage or accident which may be caused by their entries.
8. If an exhibitor is not available for pickup of their exhibits by 10 PM on Sunday of the fair, the exhibitor must find a responsible party, club leader, or superintendent to remove their exhibit. The Taylor County Fair will not be responsible for any unclaimed exhibits after 7:00 pm Monday immediately following the fair.
8. The Danish system shall be used in making awards, unless otherwise noted. Not over 25% of the exhibitors may be given awards in any place groups. Four group placings will be used per the stated percentage limitation.
10. No exhibitor will be allowed more than one entry per premium lot number, except for the market classes.
11. The Taylor County Fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur through the instrumentality of exhibits during their delivery, their exhibition, or their removal. The exhibitor shall indemnify the fair management against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto. Fair board and management shall not be responsible for personal injury, loss or theft sustained by an exhibitor or patron, aside from the exercises of reasonable care on the fairgrounds during the fair.
12. The fair board and management will not transport exhibits, nor be subjected to expense thereof.
13. All exhibits are entered and shown at the exhibitor's risk.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR RULES:

In addition to all rules listed above...

- Exhibitors are required to always have their animals under control during the fair, including unloading, showing, and loading of animals. Judges and Fair officials have the right to ask for removal of animals deemed to be a safety risk. (Safety Policy)**
1. MANDATORY BARN MEETING to be held Thursday of the fair at noon in the outdoor show ring.
 2. Barn decorations can be put in place starting at 2 p.m. the Sunday prior to the fair.
- Fair decorations must be in place by 11:30 AM on exhibit entry day and cannot be taken down until 5:30 PM on release day.

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3. No decorations shall be accessible by your animal or the adjacent animals in the barn. No foil fringe. (Safety hazard.)
4. No misting systems will be allowed in the barns.
5. Exhibitor's name must be displayed over the animal. **Exhibitors hold the primary responsibility for maintenance of their animals.** Exhibitors may get assistance with animal maintenance but shall be available upon request and not found to be unnecessarily absent from the grounds.
6. Exhibitors must keep pens, stalls and coops clean during the fair and clean out as directed by the superintendent at the close of the fair.
7. Feeding, cleaning of animals and their stalls/pens is to be done by 9:00 AM each day.
8. Exhibitors hold the primary responsibility for clipping, grooming, and fitting of livestock exhibits. Advice and assistance can be given by family, animal owner, project leaders, and/or any Taylor County Youth Fair participants. The exhibitor must be present, doing the majority of the work, and active in the process. **No paid clipping and grooming on fairgrounds.** Grooming chutes and locations are allowed at discretion of Department Superintendents.
9. Exhibitor back tags must be on exhibitors when they are showing and entry tags on small animal pens.
10. Any exhibitor noting a potential conflict in the judging schedule must notify the superintendents of both departments well in advance of the fair, so the superintendents may work with the judges to ensure each exhibitor can properly show in each department. (There is no advance deadline but requests taken at the last minute may not provide enough notice to be managed.)
11. All animal exhibitors must follow posted rules.
12. All livestock must be exhibited by the person to whom they are entered, unless special permission is granted by the fair board in advance. Exhibitors must be ready to exhibit their entries when classes are called by the superintendent, failure of doing so will be disqualified.
13. Any exhibitor who by suggestive comments or criticism, interferes with any judge, superintendent or fair board member in their work will cause the exhibits of said exhibitor to be disqualified.
14. Established evidence of fraud by exhibitors will mean disqualification.
15. In a class where an exhibitor has more than one animal it can **only** be shown by a registered livestock exhibitor.
16. Mandatory barn meeting on Sunday@12:30 PM. Barn Awards will be awarded at that time.
17. **No trailers/ vehicles allowed in barns after 3PM Wednesday. During the fair, no vehicles are allowed on the grounds after 9AM. No trailers/vehicles allowed to remain parked inside fairgrounds after animal drop-off. Supply drop-offs during the fair must be done prior to 9AM, limited to one hour, and all vehicles/trailers returned to trailer parking.**
18. **Protective footwear is required when handling any large animal or in stalls.**

Livestock Exhibitors must also follow the requirements outlined in:

ADDITIONAL ANIMAL RULES:

1. All animals must be checked by the vet before entering the grounds. No exceptions.
2. Any animal on the grounds during the fair is considered an animal exhibit, whether or not they are being shown for a premium. This includes petting zoo related animals, nursing calves, etc.
3. No dogs are allowed on the fairgrounds (excluding registered exhibiting animals and service dogs).
4. **Scratch rule: Scratches and Withdrawals** Exhibitors who have officially entered an animal by the deadline may withdraw (scratch) their entry without penalty, provided notification is received by **midnight on the Friday preceding the Fair.**

Penalties for Late Scratches:

- **First Offense:** A fine of **\$25 per head** will be assessed. This must be paid in cash to the Fair Office by the conclusion of the current Fair. Failure to settle the fine will result in a suspension from the following year's event.
- **Second Offense:** A fine of **\$50 per head** and a mandatory one-year suspension from the following year's Fair.
- **Third Offense:** A permanent and indefinite ban from all future Fair participation.

Medical Exemptions: Fines and penalties will be waived only upon the presentation of a valid **Veterinary Certificate** or a certified veterinary form documenting illness or injury. Documentation must be submitted directly to the Fair Office to validate the exemption.

Stall Management: The reallocation of pens or stalls resulting from scratched entries remains at the sole discretion of the Department Superintendents.

The penalty will be assessed to the responsible party. All premium payments will be withheld until the penalty has been settled in full.

PREMIUM CHECK RULES:

Upon award receipt, any discrepancies in ribbon placement should be addressed with the department superintendent immediately following judging.

1. Premium awards will be figured using the official and certified judging sheets. No changes shall be made that conflict with the certified judging sheets.
2. Checks shall be cut by the fair board no later than October 31st of the fair year (the last day of the fiscal year).
3. Checks shall be delivered to the organizational representatives for each club (generally the fair board member representing each club). These representatives are responsible for distributing checks to members per their own club's preference. Clubs that don't meet in the fall/winter should decide in advance how to handle check distribution.

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4. Exhibitors (including clubs winning booth premiums) shall have 90 days from the date on the check to cash the checks.
5. No lost checks shall be reissued after the date of the annual meeting. Reissued checks are subject to the original 90-day deadline.
6. Any address change notifications or other post-fair requests should be made to the local club leadership. The fair will not deliver individual premium checks.

Dept. 00 Early Youth (Cloverbuds)

Early Youth Exhibits

1. Early Youth exhibitors are in grades Kindergarten through 2nd grade as of Jan. 1 of fair year.
2. Work must be that of the member.
3. All posters must be no smaller than 11" x 14" nor larger than 14" x 22".
4. There will be no premiums; therefore the exhibitor does NOT need to register on FairEntry prior to the fair. Registration tags will be available prior to the fair for this Department.
5. A participation ribbon and a coupon for food will be provided by the Taylor County Fair for each participant.

Dairy Cattle Exhibits

1. This exhibit is open to all participants who have selected, fed and kept an accurate record of the dairy animals entered for exhibition according to requirements of the organizations to which they belong.
2. No dairy animal may be exhibited that is purchased less than three calendar months prior to the fair.
3. All animals must be dehorned.
4. Exhibitors may exhibit up to six (6) animals in this department, with a limit of one per premium number.
5. Exhibitors may enter more than one breed of cattle.
6. A milking schedule will be set by the superintendent and must be followed.
7. Premiums will be withheld from any exhibitor who does not have their animal area properly cleaned by 9:00pm on Sunday night at the close of the fair. Each superintendent will instruct the exhibitors on what needs to be cleaned for each species.
8. Exhibitor must comply with all Wisconsin State Animal Health Regulations and testing requirements.
9. Classes with fewer than 5 entries will be combined.

4. Exhibitors may enter more than one breed of cattle.
5. Classes with fewer than 5 animals may be combined.
6. Premiums will be withheld from any exhibitor who does not have their animal area properly cleaned on Sunday night at the close of the fair. Each Superintendent will instruct the exhibitors on what needs to be cleaned for each species.
7. Exhibitors must comply with all Wisconsin State Animals Health Regulations and testing requirements.

1. This exhibit is open to all participants who have selected, fed and kept an accurate record of the animals entered for exhibition according to the requirements of the organization to which they belong.
2. Exhibitors may exhibit up to six (6) animals in this department, with a maximum of three (3) market animals.
3. One animal may be entered under breeding or market classes but not both.
4. Exhibitors may enter more than one breed.
5. Classes with fewer than 6 animals may be combined.
6. All Columbias, Corriedales, Rambouillet, and Targhees shall be shown with two inches of wool or less. All other breeds shall be completely shorn between 2 months and 2 weeks prior to the fair.
7. Immediately following animal release, exhibitors are required to remove decorations and help put pens away. Premiums will be withheld from any exhibitor who does not have their animal area properly cleaned on Sunday night at the close of the fair. Each Superintendent will instruct the exhibitors on what needs to be cleaned for each species.
8. Exhibitors must comply with all Wisconsin State Animals Health Regulations and testing requirements (**this includes scrapies tags**).

HORSE EXHIBITS

1. Horses originating from within Wisconsin showing any symptoms of contagious or infectious disease will not be permitted to be shown at any fair. A negative Coggins test is required in the current year.
2. Each animal may be entered in either showmanship, horsemanship, and/or pleasure classes under the Danish system, and gymkhana and/or halter classes under regular judging. The only exception to this is the "Horseless Horse" class under showmanship and horsemanship.
3. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the horse or pony project of their respective organization.
4. No exhibitor may exhibit more than 2 head, and if exhibiting 2 animals, one of these must be owned by the member and the other may be a managerial animal as defined by project requirements. A horse with a nursing foal counts as one animal.
5. Each exhibitor must be carrying this animal as a supervised youth project as of May 15th and complete the horse registration certificate and waiver.
6. Animals must be shown by the junior member unless written permission is granted by the superintendent for another junior member to exhibit the animal.
7. No exhibitor may enter more than one animal in any one premium number.
8. No stallions shall be exhibited with the exception of suckling and weaning colts.
9. Follow state class guidelines for 4-H State Horse Expo and State Gymkhana requirements for clothing and tack. Guidelines available at the Extension Office or through Chapter representatives.
10. All exhibitors participating in the horse classes at the Taylor County Fair must wear an SEI approved helmet with chin strap fastened when mounted on a horse.
11. Inhumane treatment of animals will not be tolerated. Taylor County Fair Board and superintendents will rule on infractions.
12. Novice Class: (all grades) Exhibitors with some limited experience may remain in Novice unless the blue ribbon is won by the exhibitor at the previous Taylor County Fair.
13. 4-H members entered in the Horseless Horse Class shall attend the required workshops to learn proper care, grooming, and handling of the horse they are going to show.
14. Exhibitors grade 6 and up who win a blue ribbon in Showmanship, Horsemanship, Western or English Pleasure, Trail Class, and Horseless Horse (except for pre-novice, novice classes, and halter class) are eligible for state competition. If you are interested in showing at the State 4-H Horse Expo, your entry must be postmarked within 7 days after the Taylor County Fair Show.

15. Premiums will be withheld from any exhibitor who does not have their animal area properly cleaned by 9:00pm on Sunday night at the close of the fair. Each superintendent will instruct the exhibitors on what needs to be cleaned for each species. Exhibitors will only get paid one premium for Horsemanship or Showmanship but can be entered in both. Exhibitors will only get paid out for one other lot. Maximum of 2 lots paid out per horse. There is no limit to the lots entered.
17. Exhibitors must comply with all Wisconsin State Animal Health Regulations and testing requirements.
18. If an exhibitor is participating in Horseless Horse, they are only eligible to show under class A, lot 5, and/or class C, lot 6.

2. Each student may enter one project.
3. Each classroom may enter one group project.
4. We have very limited space. Therefore, entries are to be no larger than 14 x 22.
5. Work must be from the September – June of the current school year.
6. **ESSAY RULES** – Essay must be original and in the student's handwriting or typed on 8 ½ x 11", using one side only. Neatness, legibility, grammar, spelling, sentence and paragraph structure and content will be evaluated.
7. No exhibits shall be made of food or food products (dough, candy, crackers, etc.) The exhibit buildings are too damp and projects could be permanently damaged with these materials.
8. Sort and package your students' exhibits into grade level containers.
 - a. For example, put all of your kindergarten projects into one box or envelope and all of your first grade projects into another box or envelope.
 - b. Then label the container with your school's name and grade level. Example: Holy Rosary, Grade 1.
 - c. On the outside of the container, write the amount of exhibits in each container, along with the name of a school person's name and number that is responsible for receiving returned items. (i.e. 42 exhibits, John Doe, 715-748-0000)
 - d. If you have sculptures, you may put those in a separate container and label them separately as they will not be hung on the wall.

All exhibits will be taken down and placed back into your original marked containers and returned to the school. Contact the fair office at 715-748-3348 if alternate arrangements need to be made.
